Cops want you to cooperate

GAMES ACT They claim they have taken all steps to make Games incident-free, but expect people to swap offs, use buses and Metro

NEW DELHI: Cooperation is what the Delhi Police Chief YS Dadwal is seeking from the city during next year's Commonwealth Games. "Without holistic support from the public it would be difficult to make the Games a success," he said.

The Delhi Police on their part claim that they have taken adequate steps to ensure the Games go incident-free.

COOPERATION
If the Delhi Police have their way the school holidays next year might be rescheduled during the time of the Games. So will be the off days of some public and private offices. "These measures might be taken to keep the traffic on road to the minimum," he said. Dadwal also asked people to make maximum use of public transport during the Games. The closing ceremony falls

on a Thursday and the offices can switch Saturday-offs to that day. Similarly, police may also ask traders to close their shops on the same day and do business another day. Dadwal also asked the people to use the Metro rail service.

COMMONWEALTH GAMES ACT
The Act, which is still at proposal stage, might be in place during the Games. Under this Act people may face stringent punishment if they stray into the dedicated lane on Delhi roads marked for vehicles carrying athletes and officials.

This is the proposal given by Delhi Police to the government, which is formulating a special law for dealing with issues related to Commonwealth Games.

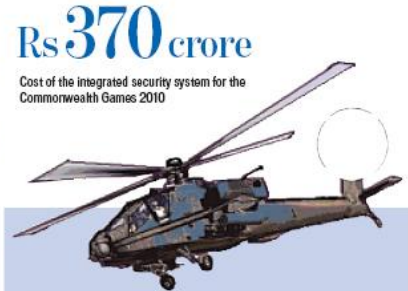
NON-CLONABLE IDENTIFICATION CARD
Even Dadwal would be wearing one of these. To check impersonation during the Games and also for the future, Delhi Police would be issued non-clonable ID Cards, which they would have to wear around their necks. The card would have a bar code to check which department an officer is from, and other details.

On the big day, when Bolt arrives at Jawahar Lal Nehru Stadium for the 100-metre dash, he will have nothing to fear from the 62,000-strong crowd cheering him. For one, there will be an anti-intrusion squad to keep rowdy fans at bay. But before the spectators get to the stands, they will have passed through a 4-layer security cordon. There will be an outer security ring for scanning vehicles, a middle ring to scan and frisk spectators, an inner ring to allow only spectators with bar-coded tickets to enter, and finally an 'exclusion ring' for a last-minute check.

A FOOL-PROOF SECURITY ARRANGEMENT

If Usain Bolt, the 'fastest man on earth', finally decides to run at next October's Commonwealth Games in Delhi, he will get a taste of Indian security at its strictest

Bolt will arrive at Terminal 3 of Indira Gandhi International Airport, which will be used exclusively to check in athletes, VIPs and other visiting dignitaries. For the duration of the Games, the airport will be guarded like a fortress.

Bolt's vehicle will need a radio frequency identification (RFI) tag to be allowed to pass. Any untagged vehicle that tries to force its way inside will be met with a 'tyre killer' - a set of iron spikes that will blow out the tyres. If a suspect vehicle manages to keep going on flat tyres, it will be stopped by solid steel bars.

After all this, Bolt may sleep easy as Indian Air Force helicopters with assault teams on board will be keeping an eye over the Games Village, round the clock.

Should Bolt visit Jamaican delegates staying at the city's five-star hotels, he will find strict security arrangements there as well. The hotels will have watch towers built near them and all their CCTV cameras monitored by senior police officials. Bomb disposal units will also be in place.

Bolt will need to carry his bar-coded ID card to get inside the village. He will pass through door frame metal detectors, and be frisked by Delhi Police personnel armed with handy metal detectors. His luggage would pass through an X-ray baggage scanner.

Approximately 7,000 CCTV cameras will be placed all over Delhi to keep an eye on any suspicious goings-on.
